A Message from Guy Carr-Harris, Chairman and CEO

Nineteen twenty-one, 100 years ago, a time when the population of Canada was just under 9 million, with Montreal being the dominant city at 618,000 people. Post World War I, our country had just elected William Lyon Mackenzie King as Prime Minister, beginning the longest term in office of any Prime Minster to date. Doctors Frederick Banting and Charles Best were developing insulin as a breakthrough method to treat diabetes. During that time the world was still recovering from the effects of the Spanish Flu Pandemic. Ironically, fast forward 100 years we are once again reminded how our lives can be so drastically altered by a Pandemic. All that aside, I like to think that the most notable event of the 1921 happened on September 1 at 1090 King Street West in Toronto, the official beginning of Canada Colors and Chemicals.



R.R. Carr-Harris, my grandfather and founder was the first President, and on September 2nd he purchased the Ammonia and Dye business of The John B. Payne Company. At that time my grandfather began a relationship with Scotiabank, a partnership that today is very much alive and well—in fact CCC is the single longest standing for profit client of the Bank. The company's office and plant were located by the CP railway lines in downtown Toronto that today is part of the trendy Liberty Village development. The business he bought was 100% focused in Ontario, with a grand total of twenty highly motivated employees and sales of \$140,000. Two years later the company obtain a business license in Manitoba and Canada Colors began its slow and steady path forward.




In **1926** Canada Colors shifted its focus from the Dye business to the Industrial Chemicals market, after losing the Kalle & Co. agency. Over the next ten years my grandfather expanded both the supplier and customer base. On July 1, **1934** my father, A.R. Carr-Harris, joined the Company and sadly two years later my grandfather passed away, and my father took over as President on January 1, **1936**. With the political and economic uncertainty that precipitated the outbreak of World War II, the European based supplier network my grandfather established came under increasing logistical challenges. As we've done numerous times over our history, the Company reinvented itself and established supply relations with North American markets.

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In **1943** Canada Colors established its first employee pension plan, which at the time was highly unusual for a small private company, particularly at the height of the war. In **1947** to take advantage of the prosperous Quebec market and Montreal being very much the economic engine of the country, we opened our first office in Montreal at 1499 Bishops Street.

In **1955** we opened our Hamilton Sales office with a focus on the western Ontario markets. Central to this endeavor was the formation of the Sales Development Department, later known as the Resins and Additives business and the building blocks of today's Plastics Sales and Marketing Group.

In **1966** we opened our sales office in Richmond, British Columbia to consolidate our Western Business. Also, in that same year we moved our Head Office from the King Street warehouse to the 6th floor at 160 Bloor Street East.


MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



In **1971** the company celebrated its 50th Anniversary with sales at the time of \$16 million and a grand total of 90 employees. In that same year we exited our leased warehouse on King Street and moved to our newly built and owned production facility on Glidden Road in Brampton, in those days a sparsely populated area. Two years later Canada Colors bought Sulco Chemicals, a sulfuric acid plant in Elmira Ontario. The purchase of Sulco has proven to be probably the most important strategic decisions the company ever made. Sulco has been a major contributor to our financial stability and has pulled us through some significant down turns in the economy.

In 1979 there were three notable events at the company: we opened our Edmonton Sales office; we purchased a plot of land in Leduc for a potential future facility; and lastly, I joined the company!!!!!!! I'll never forget my first days on the job, everyone knew my name and I knew not a soul. That said, everyone was welcoming although no one quite knew what to do with me. I was provided half a desk next to the Telex desk, clearly the noisiest spot in the office. Over the next while I had the privilege of working beside many employees in the Customer Service, Accounting, Purchasing and Marketing departments. Hopefully it wasn't a traumatic experience for anyone...



In 1980 the Company moved its Head Office to 80 Scarsdale Road in North York, our home for the next 28 years. That same year the Company introduced a new, more modern logo, the familiar "Triple Drip" look. In the following year Canada Colors entered the plastics compounding business with the purchase of Ciba Geigy's facility in Colborne, Ontario. This was a major shift from the distribution world but clearly strategically a sound-move and today is the foundation of our plastics business.

Out with the old

Two years later we purchased Chem Central's solvent business in Canada consisting of three plants and launching us into the liquids business in a significant way. We were now considered a force in that business with market presence

and a new list of key suppliers. The following year we opened a new office /warehouse in Montreal with bulk storage, blending and rail siding access. In December of that year Canada Colors reached \$100 million in sales and presented every employee with a \$100 bill to commemorate the event.

In **1986** Canada Colors helped found the CACD (Canadian Association of Chemical Distributors). This was a significant undertaking and a forum to provide a unified voice for Chemical Distributors in Canada. Up until then there really wasn't a unified program to provide education and training to this industry, the broadening of health safety and compliance was clearly essential for the betterment of the industry. The Company would go on to play a significant role with the CCPA (Canadian Chemical Producers Association) in becoming the initial chemical company certified under the safe handling principles of Responsible Care, now a global organization with over 150 company members worldwide.




In **1988** my father retired from the business and sadly passed away four years later after a lengthy illness. I was appointed Chairman of the Board and hired an outside President to lead the business for the next few years.

In **1989** the company completed a major expansion at our Brampton facility which allowed for the consolidation of our Chem Central facilities and the broadening of our offerings of capacity in packaging and value-added services. The early **1990s** saw us add to our market presence in Quebec with the purchase of the sales accounts of Shefford Chemicals, and the wide spec plastics markets through the purchase of Elliott Polymers Limited.

Over time it was abundantly clear that our manufacturing industries were under enormous pressure from south of the boarder. With that understanding, Canada Colors stepped up our efforts to service the oil and gas industries in western Canada as a way to broaden our dependence on the resource sector. Given the land we had in Leduc, we built a blending facility that was completed in **1998**. Timing in markets is everything and within two years of completion the site required the first of several growth expansions.

In **2001** the company had surpassed \$300 million in sales and employed 340 employees. By **2008** we had outgrown our Head Office facilities, so the Sales, Marketing and Logistics groups moved to a new Mississauga office near our Brampton facility and our Head Office moved back to the downtown Toronto area, ironically to 175 Bloor Street East, directly across the street from where we had been 28 years before.



With the continued growth of our oil and gas business we purchased the export business from ICTC in **2011** which provided us the opportunity to export blended products into Cuba, a service American companies couldn't compete with. This proved to be a great venture and clearly provided opportunities for additional growth within the country. In **2011** we purchased DPL Services in Saskatchewan which complimented our solvent business.

In **2012** Canada Colors engaged Inter-brand, an internationally recognized branding company. The company introduced a new logo, marketed as CCC Group, reinforcing distinct businesses with sub brands CCC Chemicals, CCC Ingredients, CCC Plastics and CCC Sulphur Products. This was a large, complicated exercise but proved invaluable in going to market in different industries that were sensitive to specialization.

One of our last expansions of the chemicals business was the purchase of APCO Industries in **2015**. This acquisition once again complimented our solvents business and was a great strategic fit.



After much deliberation and reflection on our business and the market position we occupied, I made the difficult decision to divest of the Chemicals and Ingredients businesses, moving them to Brenntag Canada in September 2018, and re-focusing the Company's presence on the Plastics and Sulphur markets. In 2019 we invested in our 3rd expansion of the Colborne plant adding 40,000 square feet to consolidate the Distribution and Manufactured businesses under one roof.

This past December CCC posted record results across all business platforms and is on track for another strong year in **2021**. In May of this year Sulco successfully installed a steam powered turbine allowing the plant to generate its own electricity.

The success of CCC has always been the people it has attracted to drive ingenuity and continued growth. For me, being the third generation to steer the company through significant changes in the business landscape has been a pleasure. Working with the people at CCC over the years has been most rewarding and immensely enjoyable. With our current leadership group of Ron Koniuch, Blair Russell, Brian Page and Brian Job, I am confident of CCC's continued success into the next century.

Four things stand out in my mind about my time at CCC:


- -Our first of several investments opening up Leduc.
